LOW VISION FAIR by Rodney Neely

May 1, 2010

This event was organized by Fairfax Lion John **Bailey and Jody** Silverberg, members of the **Prince William** Chapter of the **National Federal** of the Blind. PW County is one of the most difficult communities to live in for the blind and disabled. This event is a huge step in the right direction.



On Saturday, May I, 2010, the Prince William County chapter of the National Federation of the Blind sponsored a Low Vision Fair at the Prince William County government building. The purpose of this event was to let people know that they can still lead productive lives, even if they have lost their vision.

District Governor Tony Reyes, Lion Larry Povinelli, and Fairfax Lions Jay Kahn, John Bailey, and Rodney Neely attended this event.

There were six assistive technology vendors and two blind educators present at this event. With a wide variety of closed circuit televisions, magnifiers,

computerized reading machines, and many other types devises on display. Some of the free services that were exhibited at the low vision fair included a camp for blind children, methods of learning to read Braille, and NFB Newsline (a free dial-in newspaper reading service which provides access to over 300 news publications for people who have difficulty reading printed material).

More than twenty visitors came to see what types of assistive technology is available for people who are losing their vision. All of the participants had an opportunity to experience the assistive technology hands-on in a very relaxed atmosphere.

There were two main highlights of the day. The Low Vision Fair was featured on WTOPs News Radio – covered by Mr. Hank Silverburg who is a Northern Virginia WTOP reporter. The second highlight was that District Governor Tony Reyes



recruited two new Lions for the Lake Ridge Lions Club. Congratulations Lake Ridge!






arrived at 9 in the morning to set up a n d started taking customers around 10.

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MARIO BONDS, VLEI SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT UPDATE

Mario Bonds has received several VLEI Scholarships from the Fairfax Lions Club. The most recent one was at the May 5, 2009 dinner meeting. He is an articulate young man with an upbeat attitude. Mario is welcome back to any Lion event he would like to attend. The Fairfax Lion's wish him nothing but happiness and success in life.

Long before sunrise Friday, Mario Bonds was on the second floor of his home in Bowie, ironing a green graduation gown, fitting his cap and talking to his guide dog, an English Lab named Sidney, about how special the day was going to be.

"You are going to walk across that stage. It is time to go to work," Bonds, 22, said as he sprinted down a flight of steps and grabbed his dog's harness in preparation for the trek to George Mason University to receive his bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism.

His graduation was the proud culmination of a struggle that began in infancy. Bonds is a triplet in a family of 10 children. His mother died of a brain aneurysm when he was 5 months old. His father has been in prison most of his life.

Bonds was born with morning glory syndrome, a disease that attacks the optic nerve, and went blind when he was 8. He has been shuttled among emergency shelters, cheap motels, public housing and, finally, the home offered by the Duprees, the parents of a high school classmate.

Despite his hardships, Bonds has been a

leader. When he was at Suitland High School, in Prince George's County, he served as a counselor and teacher during a technology summer camp by the Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind. He is an accomplished singer and pianist who has more than a million hits on YouTube.

"Our family was quite destitute all my life, so I used education and music to deal with the dysfunction," he said.

Bonds credits his grandmother, Johnnie Mae Bonds, for not allowing him to be placed in a special school. In a 2004 Washington Post



story she said, "He don't have a disability. . . . He's blind. He has a good brain."

About five years ago, Dupree took in the Bonds triplets, Mario and his two sisters. Her son had told her about a young man in the high school choir who didn't have a place to stay. She said that although the sisters stayed for about two weeks, their brother remained because he wanted stability in his senior year.

Michelle Weil, retired Fairfax Country Teacher had met Bonds years earlier, when his family moved to Fairfax County, and she became his mobility instructor, teaching him to use a cane and walk with a guide dog. "They were homeless and moved into a hotel. He called me from the Breezeway Motel," Weil said.

One day in middle school, Bonds and other blind students went to the campus of George Mason on a field trip. "From age 12, I knew that this was going to be my school," Bonds said.

Although Bonds doesn't have his immediate family, he has developed a support network that includes MetroAccess drivers, taxi drivers, friends and a few cousins.

In addition to making good on his GMU dream, he is a program assistant in the civil rights office of the U.S. Department of Transportation. He also is the minister of music at Mt. Zion-Warren United Methodist Church in Dickerson.

On Friday, Bonds never stopped smiling as he and Sidney walked across the stage at GMU; 13 of his relatives were in the audience.

Bonds said that although he has "a small amount of bitterness" because he can't see, it is overcome by joy. "It's emotional to me, because 85 percent of working-age blind adults are unemployed. It is a big deal to me that more than 50 percent of blind high school students don't graduate or go to college," he said.

"The bitterness stems from how difficult this has been because there are still problems with the level of services the visually impaired still get," Bonds said. "I had to work through those problems but at the same time trying to make sure I got adequate grades to get to this day."

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CAMPFIRE ECLAIRS by Marilyn Tanner

In honor of the Northern Virginia Lion Youth Camp Earth Day trip in May, I bring you: Campfire Éclairs

INGREDIENTS:

Sticks (approx. 26" long & thickness of broom handle)

Crescent Roll refrigerator dough (must keep refrigerated until use)

Aluminum foil

Margarine

I single serve vanilla pudding (shelf-safe) for each éclair

Tub of chocolate frosting

DIRECTIONS

Wash hands well before touching food. Cover one end of stick (approx. 8 inches) with aluminum foil. Using your fingers cover foil lightly with margarine.

On a flat surface, place two crescent roll dough triangles together so that they form a rectangle

Pinch diagonal edges together to form a uniform rectangle of dough. Enrobe stick end with dough, pinching end and side seam closed.

Slowly roast éclair over glowing coals (not flame) until dark golden brown dough should be cooked.

Slide éclair off of stick onto paper plate and let cool slightly.

Holding éclair vertically (hole-up), spoon pudding into éclair interior (do not over-

Place éclair onto plate and, using a knife, spread the top of the with éclair chocolate frost-


