Fairfax Lion Speaks at National Federation of the Blind Meeting

Thanks to Lion Rodney Neely and former club member John Bailey for this report.

Dr. Suleiman Alibhai spoke at the June 15, 2017 meeting of the Fairfax chapter of the National Federation of the Blind.

Blind and visually impaired individuals are disproportionately unemployed or underemployed when compared to individuals with other disabilities. They are also likely to be marginalized and misunderstood by the "sighted population." At this meeting Dr Alibhai urged representatives of low vision organizations to educate and inform the public that blind and visually impaired individuals live normal productive lives raising families, working and participating in recreational activities just like normally sighted individuals. Interactions between normally sighted and visually impaired individuals at schools, in the workplace and social/recreational events is one way to the bridge the gap between these two groups. While there are totally blind individuals, there are also many people who are classified as being "low vision" meaning they cannot see normally even with glasses or contact lenses. Regardless of the classification, everyone deserves the opportunity to interact and participate in society in a productive manner. All should become aware of the issues related to being blind or low vision and know how best to engage with individuals regardless of their vision status.



In reporting on the meeting, John Bailey said: "We wish to thank Dr. Alibhai for taking the time to come and speak to us. Here is a link to a short video of Dr. Alibhai talking about some of the points he wanted to make during the evening."

Eyeglasses For the Needy

Lion Marilyn Tanner has assumed leadership - from Elden Wright - of this Club Eyeglass program. (Note: This is not the same as our collection of donated eyeglasses and

hearing aids for recycling, which Lion Scott Dulaney leads.) Under Elden, for Lions year 2016-2017, Fairfax Lions Club provided 30 pair of eyeglasses. (The prior table of charity expenditures shows \$1500 for Eyeglasses - that is the cost of the 30 pair of eyeglasses we purchased for needy persons.) Lion Marilyn is leveraging an agreement made in 2015 by Lion Davida Luehrs, whereby myeveDr will provide eyeglasses across VA Lions District 24A for \$50 a pair. Marilyn will accept eyeglass requests only from the Fairfax County Health Department, which verifies financial need of individuals requesting eyeglasses.

EYEGLASS RECYCLING

Lion Scott Dulaney and team collected 204 pairs of eyeglasses in July from area collection boxes, for processing and distribution. Seven Fairfax Lions volunteered 14 hours at the Eyeglass Recycling Center in July.

NURSING HOME BINGO

Many thanks to former club member Marcia Selva for leading bingo at the Fairfax Nursing Center in July. Three other Lions and one spouse helped call bingo. Fifteen Nursing Center residents participated.

Officer Lasowitz gave us tips to avoid scams and fraud:

1. Hang It Up!

Hang up the telephone if someone calls you and wants to sell you something.

Never give out:

- personal information.
- credit card numbers.
- bank account information, social security number.
- · living arrangement,
- · health status.
- income,
- · Medicare number, or
- driver's license number. If you are interested in buying a product over the telephone, ask the company to send you the information in the mail. A reputable company will be happy to send you the information.

Remember, HANG IT UP!

2. Tear It Up!

Seniors receive sweepstakes correspondence informing them that they have won a prize

If the sweepstake is legitimate, you should not have to send any money. give out any financial information, or buy anything to win that prize.



Be very careful of flashy envelopes or personalized letters. Companies spend millions on mailings in order to appeal to the consumer. If you do not think it is legitimate, TEAR IT UP

3. Don't Open It Up!



Not only do you have to be careful of door-to-door salespeople offering free products and services, you also have to be careful of professional con artists or criminals who want to take your money.

your door that you do not know, DON'T OPEN IT UP!

If the person is persistent, call the police and ask them to come by and check on your home.

And, actions to take if we encounter identity theft:

Lost or Stolen Personal Information?* Use these "QUICK STEPS"

FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS

- 1. Close credit card and bank accounts immediately.
- 2. Place passwords on new accounts. (Avoid using your mother's Maiden name, birth dates or phone numbers.)
- 3. If stolen, file a police report in the jurisdiction of the theft with your local police department.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

- Call one of the three nationwide Consumer Reporting Companies.
- 2. File an "Initial Fraud Alert" & "Victim's Statement."

FILE AN INITITAL FRAUD ALERT

- Appropriate for stolen wallets, credit cards and "phishing" scams.
- Stays on your credit report for 90 days.
- Order one free credit report from each of the three nationwide consumer reporting companies.

DRIVER'S LICENSE OR GOVERNMENT ISSUED IDENTIFICATION

- Contact the agency that issued the license or ID.
- 2. Follow their procedures to cancel the document & get a new one.
- 3. Ask them to flag your file, so no one else can get a license or documentation from them in your name.

KEEP A WRITTEN RECORD of all your contacts including: The date, time and names of each person you contact.

EVERETT EUGENE BIERMAN (Age 92)

Of Fairfax County, VA on July 23, 2017 at his home in Oakton, VA. Beloved husband (64 years) of the late Joyce Elizabeth Bierman. Devoted father of James E. Bierman, Karen J. Bierman, Marta E. Williams, and the late Robert E. Bierman. Son of the late Herbert and Lulu Bierman. Brother of Russell, Glen and Quentin. He is also survived by two grandchildren, Tasha Cantrell and Rowan Quinn, and two great grandchildren. He was a WWII Vet (Army) with 30 years of government service. He was a US Ambassador to Papua New Guinea. A memorial service will be held at Fairfax United Methodist Church, 10300 Stratford Ave., Fairfax, VA 22030 on Saturday, August 26, 2017 at 1 p.m. with a reception to follow. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made to the American Heart Association.

Ev was born August 16, 1924, in Hastings, NE. He served in the US Army, 1942-1946, and graduated from Purdue University (BS, 1948) and the American University (MA, 1958). Ev had a distinguished career highlighted by serving as minority staff director for the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the US House of Representatives, then as the US Ambassador to Papua, New Guinea.

Ev was recognized with other local WW2 veterans by the Washington Post (Veterans Day, Nov 11, 2014). Just For You

Nine Lifestyle Changes Can Reduce Dementia Risk

You may have seen results of a new Study in the media lately; THIS SHOULD INTEREST YOU.

BOTTOM LINE: One in three cases of dementia could be prevented if more people looked after their brain health throughout life: not smoking, doing exercise, keeping a healthy weight, treating high blood pressure and diabetes

can all reduce the risk of dementia, as well as cardiovascular disease, and cancer.

The study was presented at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference in London, and lists nine key risk factors. At current rates, by 2050, 131 million people could be living with dementia globally. There are estimated to be 47 million people with the condition at the moment.

The nine factors that contribute to the risk of dementia

- Mid-life hearing loss responsible for 9% of the risk
- Failing to complete secondary education 8%
- Smoking 5%
- Failing to seek early treatment for depression 4%
- Physical inactivity 3%
- Social isolation 2%
- High blood pressure 2%
- Obesity 1%
- Type 2 diabetes 1%

These risk factors add up to 35%. The other 65% of dementia risk is currently thought to be non-modifiable.

The good news - ON THOSE THINGS YOU CAN CONTROL, YOU CAN ACT NOW TO REDUCE YOUR RISK OF DEMENTIA!

"Although dementia is diagnosed in later life, the brain changes usually begin to develop years before," said lead author Professor Gill Livingston, University College London.

"Acting now will vastly improve life for people with dementia and their families and, in doing so, will transform the future of society."

The report, which combines the work of 24 international experts, says lifestyle factors can play a major role in increasing or reducing an individual's dementia risk.

Failure to complete secondary education was a major risk factor, and the authors suggest that individuals who **continue to learn throughout life** are likely to build additional brain reserves.

Another major risk factor is hearing loss in middle age the researchers say this can deny people a cognitively rich environment and lead to social isolation and depression, which are among other potentially modifiable risk factors for dementia.

Another key message from the report is that what is good for the heart is good for the brain. Not smoking, doing exercise, keeping a healthy weight, treating high blood pressure and diabetes can all reduce the risk of dementia, as well as cardiovascular disease, and cancer.

The researchers say they did not have enough data to include dietary factors or alcohol in their calculations but believe both could be important. See more info, and a VIDEO: http://www.bbc.com/news/health-40655566
