I began my educational career at the Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind in Staunton, VA. After 4.5 years, I was permitted to go to public school. I graduated from Douglas Freeman high school in Richmond, VA in 1981. I attended the University of Maryland for two years, and then I transferred to James Madison University, where I majored in Spanish and English. I graduated from JMU in 1985.

I obtained a masters in Business Administration from George Mason University in 1990.

I am currently attending George Mason University, where I am pursuing a Masters in Public Policy with a concentration in Transportation Policy, Operations, and Logistics.

I have known that I wanted to become a Lion since I was in high school. One of the Lions asked me to speak to the Richmond Host Lions Club about the Virginia Voice-a radio reading service in the Richmond, VA metro area. I was trying to raise money for this organization because I worked there while I was in high school.

I knew that one of the first organizations that I would join after I had completed my education and gotten a job would be the Lions Club. I always wanted to work to become a positive role model for blind people-to let some of the Lions know that blind people can have careers and become productive members of society. I liked educating professionals about the capabilities of blind people, and I thought that by becoming a member of the Lions Club that I could do this.

I joined the Falls Church Lions Club in 1992. I moved away from the area in 1993. Then I rejoined the Lions in 1997 in Roanoke, VA. But our club was not very active. I rejoined the Falls Church Lions in 1999. I moved to Vienna in 2003. I transferred my membership to the Vienna Host Lions in 2003. I was awarded a Melvin Jones Fellowship in 2008 by the Vienna Host Lions Club. I transferred my membership

to the Fairfax Lions club in January of 2010.

I will participate in most of the Lions events. I am most excited about helping with fundraising, some publicity, membership recruitment, and food baskets. I will also continue to serve on Lion Dennis Brining's cabinet as the Special Needs Equipment Coordinator during the 2010-2011 Lions year.

My most satisfying experience with the Lions was being asked by one of the past district governors to serve as one of the Sight First Coordinators for our zone in 2006-2007.

I also enjoy helping blind/visually impaired young people get the assistive technology that they can use to become productive members of society.

I currently work as a Contract Specialist for the United States Environmental Protection Agency. I help with administerring some contracts to help the USEPA to clean up Superfund sites.

I am involved in helping to schedule furniture pick ups for the Committee for Helping Others



in Vienna, VA. I am also a member of Vienna Presbyterian Church. I am a member of the National Federation of the Blind, where I specialize in helping people with issues pertaining to public transportation advocacy.

I like to travel, but I am lucky to find the time to go on one or two vacations a year. I usually travel within the United States.

I enjoy visiting American cities which have musical entertainment associated with them.

I like to visit Hylton Head, SC and Virgina Beach, VA for casual vacations.

I want to go to South America, especially to Bolivia, Chilli, and Argentina.

Lion Helped to Raise Flag at Iwo Jima





Wisconsin native and Lion John Bradley has a special place in the history of World War II. As a Navy Corpsman on Iwo Jima, he treated the wounded and comforted the dying. He saved many Marines during his service on the island.

After the war, John told his son that he had reached Mt. Suribachi after heavy fighting. He noticed some Marines struggling

with a slightly bent long iron pipe. As he looked closer, John realized that the pipe was being used as a makeshift flag pole for Old Glory. He helped the Marines raise the flag that could be seen all over the island. It was a proud moment as horns and sirens of nearby ships paid tribute to Old Glory flying in the breeze. A combat photographer took what would become one of the most famous photographs of the war.

John continued to save lives until he was wounded in the leg. He would not leave the battle field until he had treated all Marines around him. John was awarded the Navy Cross and other decorations for his heroism.

After the war, John returned home to Wisconsin, where he became a successful businessman and civic leader in his small community. He volunteered at the nearby veterans' hospital and was an active Lion.

WINTER CONFERENCE



Despite the directions, 216 Lions from District 24A found their way to the Winter Conference at the Fredericksburg Hospitality House on February 20, 2010. The morning provided many opportunities to buy buy- Silent Auctions, Cheer Baskets, purses and jewelry, and raffles!



Breakout sessions throughout the day went on without a hitch. I attended Dennis Brining's presentation titled "Where humanitarian efforts should go in future years" discussing Lion efforts on a large, international scale. River Blindness medication is \$1 per treatment and hundreds of thousands of people can be reached in one distribution. Grants



have gone toward building hospitals that treat a whole region for the same amount of money that it costs for Habitat for Humanity to build a modest home in the DC Area. The Sight First Program grant has

raised \$232.5 million, funded 956 projects in 100 countries, performed 7.6 million cataract surgeries, and treated 131 million people for River Blindness. The audience



was very interested and asked a lot of informed questions. I learn something new whenever I talk to Dennis.

Second, I attended "How to plan a service project from start to finish" put on by two women in the Aquia Harbor club. The talk and slide show explored their partnership with the local Head Start Program for underprivileged kids who made need to catch up in school before they even start. Each year the lions organize a breakfast with Santa, personalized gifts for all the children who attend, and creative activities throughout the event.

We took a break for lunch where Tony Reyes was the guest speaker and introduced the current cabinet. After lunch, Elden Wright presented eight \$1500 VLEI scholarships. Two of the recipients were sponsored by the Fairfax Host Lions Club.



Matthew Borne, who just graduated from JMU, plans to use his scholarship toward student loans. He is currently working for a moving company while he looks for a job more in his field of study.



Anne Pimby received her third grant from the Fairfax Lions. She lost her sight at age 51 and realized that she would need a new career. She is currently in a program at NoVa Community College but has applied to transfer to GMU in the fall. Her degree will allow her to work rehabilitating others in her situation and teach them how to lead a normal life.

The Fairfax Lions won NO raffles, Cheer Baskets, Scavenger hunt prizes, etc despite spending all of my grocery money for the week on tickets!

During the third Breakout session, I attended a discussion bridging the communication gap between Traditionalist/Baby-Boomer Lions and Generation Y/ Leos. The speaker said to reach all of the members in his club, they mail letters, leave, voice messages, email, and facebook. It has sparked my own interest in update our website and creating a Fairfax Lion Facebook page.






