
<u>Vision Screening - United Methodist Church Pre-School</u>


On March 18-19, the Lions team of Marty Lockard, Gordon Tillery, and Harry Pontius were invited to the Fairfax United Methodist Church Preschool to screen the student's vision. Over the two days, we screened 56 children between the ages of 3 and 5, and referred 5 children (9%) for professional eye care follow-up. We also screened the vision of 7 adult teachers with 1 referral. We had screened youngsters at this location before, and it is always fun and rewarding service. The children are interested in our screening process. We try to explain to each child, in basic terms, the camera and what it does to check their vision. One teacher told us the youngsters talked to each other afterwards about "the colorful lights on the camera." Good news: most of the youngsters had healthy vision; we were able to identify the few children needing a follow-up examination.



Three steps in our screening process:

- (Left) Screen each child with the SPOT camera system.
- (Right) Record the results for each child, including a referral form if appropriate.
- 3. (Below) Brief the teacher on the results.



Next on the meeting agenda was an informal discussion of three ideas the club is considering:

- (1) Change the format for the 2nd dinner meeting, to stimulate interest among club members in club operations and also hold the monthly Board meeting immediately after that 2nd meeting;
- (2) Streamline the number of committees and assign all members to at least one committee, to encourage more interest among members; and
- (3) Reduce the size of the Board of Directors.

 At the time of the March 5th dinner meeting, all of these ideas were still evolving in details.

Lion Phil Mayo announced the Remington Lions Club is holding a spaghetti dinner on March 30 as a fund raiser for the youth camp.

King Lion Karen Udell Parker announced that a few LOV Raffle ticket books are still available, and <u>ALL MUST BE TURNED IN TO HER</u> (with payment) <u>by the April 16th dinner meeting</u>. (Hopefully, after you have paid your taxes!)

March 19th

Lion Mike Greeley brought a guest, Bill Szymanski. We had met Bill previously, when Mike brought Bill and his spouse to one of our monthly dinner socials at the Auld Shebeen restaurant. Thank you Mike for bringing Bill to this dinner meeting!



After dinner, King Lion Karen Udell Parker introduced our guest speaker, Sang Yi. Sang - a former member of Fairfax Lions Club - is a a senior congressional aide focused on government oversight issues and policy, also serves as a lieutenant commander in the US Navy Reserve, and is a newly elected member of the Fairfax City Council.

Sang spoke about several considerations by the Council; one in particular is the concern that infrastructure may not be capable of supporting potential residential growth. Of great relevance to our club, Sang recounted how Lion Marty Lockard had brought to the Council's attention the "processing fees" our club (and all 501(c)(3) organizations) had tp pay to obtain permits for seasonal sales such as our annual fruit sales. The Mayor and the Council took action, and the

zoning ordinance was amended eliminating the need for a permit for our fruit sales. GREAT WORK!

In open forum discussion, Sang commented the Council may be able to identify community needs that Fairfax-area service clubs (members of the ISCC) could consider taking on, as a way to better align with the service needs of our community. (Note: See item on the ISCC later in this newsletter.)

After our dinner meeting, Sang posted on his facebook page:

"Thanks to the Fairfax Host Lions Club and President Karen Parker for having me speak at their bi-monthly meeting yesterday evening to talk about development and other matters in the City. I enjoyed the discussion with a very civically engaged group, and am very appreciative of the charitable works the Lions Club members do for our community. Since June of last year, they collected more than 6,000 pairs of eyeglasses and several hearing aids to donate to those in need."

Sang's reference to donated eyeglasses is based on the report given at the meeting by Lion Scott Dulaney: so far this Lions year, our club has collected 6840 pairs of donated eyeglasses and delivered them to the eyeglass recycling center for processing.

KL Karen reminded members of these two items:

- (1) IF YOU HAVE LIONS OF VA RAFFLE TICKETS, YOU MUST TURN THEM IN TO KAREN BY THE APRIL 16 DINNER MEETING, ALONG WITH A CHECK OF \$30 PAYABLE TO FAIRFAX LIONS CLUB. (And, our club nets \$20 of the \$30.)
- (2) Club bylaws require an *election meeting* in April. Because Charter Night is on April 7th, the only regular meeting in April is on April 16th. Those Bylaws stipulate:

"An election meeting shall be held at the first meeting in April of each year. Notice of the election meeting shall be published by regular post or electronic means or by personal delivery to each member of the club at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior the date of the meeting. Such notice shall include the names of all nominees approved at the preceding nomination meeting, and, subject to Section 4 above, a statement that these nominees will be voted upon at this election meeting. No nominations may be made from the floor at the election meeting."

Fairfax Lions Club is a member - along with 22 other local service organizations - of the City's ISCC. You may be interested to know, FHLC started the ISCC. In December 1977, Fairfax Lion (and Past Lions International Director) Charles Mowery was the founding President of ISCC.)

ISCC meets monthly, shares news of each club, strives to discuss topics of mutual interest to all, and conducts the city's Volunteer-of-the-Year celebration each year. At the March meeting, ISCC approved donating \$100 to Fairfax HS All Night Grad Party. (The funds come from dues paid by the 23 ISCC member clubs.) Designation of a "Volunteer-of-the-Year" by each service club is submitted to ISCC in May, in preparation for the August 7, 2019 Ceremony. Note: Last year, FHLC's Lion-of-the-Year was Marilyn Tanner; she was recognized in the city's ceremony.

Mutual benefit discussion topics to be addressed in future ISCC meetings:

- Membership what methods/processes are useful to your club?
- Liability Insurance does your club carry blanket liability insurance, do you require members/participants to sign waivers, and do you purchase liability insurance for specific events/activities?

Social security imposter scam generates 35,000 complaints

From all reports, the scam business is thriving. For example, in 2017, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) received 3,200 complaints about social security imposter scams. In 2018, the number of similar complaints grew to over 35,000 and accounted for an over \$10 million-plus loss for American consumers.



The scam goes something like this. An unsuspecting consumer receives a telephone call. The caller ID says the call is from the Social Security Administration (SSA). It might even reveal the agency's actual phone number. That bit of information is often the difference between someone answering the call or declining it. However, that caller ID display is not entirely reliable. Unscrupulous scammers can generate any number they desire on that display. And they know people are more likely to answer a call from an official government number.

The caller might tell you that your social security number has been suspended because of suspicious activity. He may say your number has been linked to a crime involving drugs or illegally transferring money out of the country. In the most recent version of this scam, the caller will pinpoint the location of that crime to Texas.

In another version of the scam, the caller says your social security number was used to apply for credit cards, thus jeopardizing your bank account. To protect your money, he instructs you to withdraw all your money to keep it safe.

Not surprisingly, the scam ends with the purported social security employee giving you very specific instructions about purchasing gift cards and then sharing the codes on those cards with him —so he can monitor activity on the cards. While it may seem farfetched, keep in mind this type of scam robbed American consumers of more than \$10 million last year.

How to protect yourself

Here are some things you can do to protect yourself from these sinister scams:

- **1.** Don't trust your caller ID display. Keep your guard up until you're certain you're speaking to someone credible.
- **2.** Don't be surprised that the caller knows a lot about you, including your social security number. In today's digital world, getting these numbers and other similar information is ridiculously easy for those who know where to look.
- **3.** The SSA will never call you to say your account is about to be suspended or that your bank account is about to be seized.
- **4.** The SSA will never call to demand that you wire money or send them gift card codes. Anyone who does this is a scammer.
- **5.** If someone calls you for any reason, don't give them all or part of your social security number over the phone.

If you receive a call like this, hang up and then call the real SSA at 1-800-772-1213 to tell them about your experience. You should also contact the Federal Trade Commission to file a complaint (ftc.gov/complaint).
