Food (canned chicken and tuna) was also purchased with the remaining Food Basket Delivery program account balance of \$85. Vision Screening at The Lamb Center

Fairfax Host Lions Club completed vision screenings at The Lamb Center on May 13 and May 14. We attempted to screen 23 Guests, successfully screened 21, and referred 12 (57%) for a complete eye exam. The 57% ratio is one of the highest we've experienced. We can't confirm this, but we believe one Guest had cataracts and a considerable amount of damage in one eye. We screened several guests in their 70s and one guest who was 81. Two Fairfax Lions worked about 10 hours for this service activity.

<u>Lions Reading Action Program –</u> Striving to Improve the Literacy of Young Readers

For the second year in a row, Fairfax Lions Club chose the Main Street Child Development Center (CDC) to receive books in support of its Lions Reading Action Program (LRAP). The program's primary goal is to improve the reading literacy of young children. The CDC is located in Fairfax City,

and serves many low-income families.

A total of 93 books were purchased from Barnes and Noble, at a special discount rate. Book titles like Pig the Pug, Dear Zoo, We're Going on a Bear Hunt and We Planted a Tree were on display at the May 7 dinner meeting. Many members couldn't help but chuckle at the comical illustrations and antics of Pig the Pug. Each book bears a sticker that identifies it as being contributed by the Fairfax Lions Club.

King Lion Karen Udell Parker called the meeting to order, and after the meal announced Lion Jim Kaplan to introduce the speaker: Ms. Chloe Ritter, Multimodal Transportation Planner for the City of

Fairfax. Chloe spoke at length about various goals, plans, and features of the local transportation network. She noted that 1/3 of all household trips are less than one mile in distance, but 1/2 of those trips are DRIVEN! In response to a question about synching stop lights - so traffic may flow more smoothly - Chloe stated the local government has specialists in traffic flow that focus on best timing and synching of the traffic lights. 
IPP Marty Lockhard (photo on left) made a report on Vision Screening conducted at the Lamb Center on May 13-14. (See report under Service).

A request was made from the floor, by Lion Jim Kaplan, that the Board consider supporting the Fairfax HS All-Night Grad Party, which is short of finding this year. Jim also said we might consider other area All-Night-Grad

Parties, which all provide a celebration environment for graduating kids while discouraging alcohol use. Board members present said they would take this up.

Lion Scot Dulaney (photo on Right) brought a pair of eyeglasses with red-blinking-lights (sort of

reminiscent of Elton John?) that allegedly showed up in one of the eyeglass collection boxes. (Note: Our Club's eyeglass recycling service program has collected 9547 pair of donated eyeglasses - and 16 hearing aids - as of May 31 this year, and delivered them to the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center of NOVA.)





Board Meeting - May 28th

Your Board approved disbursement of \$1500 from Charity funds, \$500 to each of three local high schools to support their All-Nite-Graduation Parties. The HS: Fairfax, Woodson, Robinson. KL Karen is a strong advocate of such youth programs. The motivating factor behind the PTSA sponsored All-Night-Grad parties is to provide graduating seniors a safe, fun place to spend graduation night and celebrate with fellow students and friends. Since All-Night-Grad Party inception, no teen in the entire state of VA has been involved in a traffic fatality on graduation night! (See: https://www.fairfaxptsa.org/about-all-night-grad-ang). We owe a big Thank-You to Lion Jim Kaplan for this proposal, and also to Treasurer Rob Higginbotham for his hasty communication with the PTSA's and quick disbursement of the checks!

The Board also endorsed KL Karen and PCC Harry Parker as our delegates to the International Convention, and also heard a proposal to be Host Club for the VA Lions State Convention in April, 2021 - see discussion below.

PLS READ 2021 Lions State Convention – Will Fairfax be the "Host" Club? By Lion Mike Rumberg

The annual Lions State Convention will be returning to northern Virginia in 2021. It will be held April 22-24, 2021, at the Dulles Hyatt Hotel. The annual convention is when Lions from all over VA vote to make changes to our state constitution, elect District Governors, hold the grand-finale of the Bland Contest, recognize and celebrate state-wide and individual club achievements, meet and network Lions from all over, and other activities.

Our club has first crack at the opportunity to be the Convention "Host" Club (because PCC Lion Harry Parker is the chair of the convention planning committee). Being the "host" club means we provide the "Lion-power" to handle the registration process & vendor exhibit venues (the 2 most time-intensive admin tasks of the convention). As a reward for helping make the convention successful, a convention "host" club receives a contribution of about \$3,000 which may be used for either Admin or Charity needs.

This is a wonderful fundraising opportunity: \$3,000 is about 10% of our annual Charities activities budget and also of our Admin budget. That would make for a very nice boost to our activities in our 70th year!

The convention committee pays all convention expenses so being the host requires no financial resources from our club. However, committing to being the convention host means committing to a significant amount of work. Club members will need to be involved in preparing, mailing out & receiving registration materials in the months leading up to the convention and then many members will be needed in the several days before and during the convention to staff the registration tables and monitor vendor exhibits. This is not really much more work than what we do 3 times a year for our Fruit Sales, except that it will all be all indoors and involve no heavy lifting.

The Board of Directors needs to make a decision at the July board meeting. So we want to know what members think. Please discuss with a Club officer (KL Karen Parker, 1stVP Mike Rumberg, incoming 1stVP Mike Greeley) or Lion Ken Schutz (who lead the registration process when the convention was in NoVA a few years ago), or any Board member. The Club needs to understand YOUR interest in taking on such an event. We do not want to sign up for it, and later find out only about 5 people are actually willing / available to help.

We all know Lions Clubs are present in many countries around the world. Some of you have brought back photos so demonstrating, and some of you have even visited clubs overseas.



Your newsletter editor was recently in Italy (a lovely country filled with good people, good food, and many tourist attractions). The city of Pisa - known for its leaning tower - has a Lions Club as evidenced by the photo on the left.

In foreign lands I often visit cemeteries - as they can be very interesting places. In Portofino, Italy - a small, lovely sea-side town near Santa Margherita Ligure - one local cemetery is in a beautiful spot at the rear of a church on a hill side overlooking the

Mediterranean Sea. Burial plots are packed tightly next to each other, and each is lovingly maintained in honor of the departed person.

This photo (right) shows one marker that obviously honors the departed person and also announces that person was a proud member of the local Lions Club.





While not related to *Lions*Information, I was interested in the world-wide presence of Amazon and the delivery means of Amazon packages in the city of Venice. In Venice canals serve as roads. Do you see the Amazon Smile packages (with the smiley logo) stacked on a delivery boat on a canal in Venice.

Just a Thought -- 75 Years After D-Day

On June 6, 1944, and during the days that followed, men from all over the world came to fight in Normandy to defeat Nazism and re-establish freedom. Normandy will bear the scars (the hallmarks of freedom) forever from that moment in history, and every year we remember and pay tribute to the veterans from America, Britain, Canada, Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Norway, Poland, Australia, the French resistance, and their brothers in arms - those many heroes who lost their lives during that summer of 1944.

Codenamed Operation Overlord, the battle began on June 6 as 156,000 American, British and Canadian forces landed on five beaches along a 50-mile stretch of the heavily fortified coast of France's Normandy region. The invasion was one of the largest amphibious military assaults ever.

Prior to D-Day, the Allies conducted a large-scale deception campaign which misled the Germans about the intended invasion target - it helped assure success. Long before dawn on June 6, thousands of paratroopers and glider troops were already on the ground behind enemy lines, securing bridges and exit roads, and creating confusion for the enemy - actions that all helped. US Army Cavalry soldiers, at 4:45AM silently swam ashore the St. Marcoufs Islands...6000 yards off Utah Beach, armed only with knives to neutralize enemy prior to the main landings. The amphibious invasions began at 6:30AM. British and Canadians overcame light opposition to capture beaches codenamed Gold, Juno and Sword, as did Americans at Utah Beach. US forces faced heavy resistance at Omaha Beach, and suffered over 2,000 American casualties. Omaha Beach was represented in the opening scenes of the film "Saving Private Ryan." Picture that in your mind - the surf turned red with blood, brave young men - each terribly afraid, but each moving forward doing his job.

By day's end, allied troops successfully stormed Normandy's beaches. The cost was high; more than 9,000 Allied soldiers were killed or wounded in that one day. But their sacrifice allowed the allies to begin the hard slog across Europe to defeat Adolf Hitler's forces.

By late August 1944, all of northern France had been liberated; the Battle of the Bulge was next; but, by the following spring the Allies had defeated Hitler. D-Day was the beginning-of-the-end of the war in Europe.

A memorial to D-Day sits upon 88 acres in Bedford, VA. The center is a tall arch embellished with the name "Overlord;" the arch is highlighted by a reflecting pool and a scene symbolic of the arduous trudge soldiers made across blood stained beaches of Normandy.

Why Bedford? Bedford provided a company of soldiers to the US Army's 29th Infantry Division that landed at Omaha Beach, and more soldiers to the First Infantry Division. 19 Bedford soldiers died in the D-Day invasion; 2 more Bedford soldiers died later in the Normandy campaign; and another 2 died fighting elsewhere. Bedford's population in 1944 was about 3,200 people; proportionally, Bedford suffered the nation's severest D-Day losses of any city.

On June 6th, we honor our Nation, our Allies, and all who fought for victory...that Greatest Generation to whom we owe our freedom today! Think about it.
