I have three children, two used to be Main Street students, and my youngest currently attends. We had a great Thanksgiving and the extra bonus of the cake mix and frosting was perfect for my youngest son's birthday yesterday.

Thank you again for your kindness, it was so appreciated.

We also received a similar thank-you card in January for a December food basket. It is difficult for some of us to relate to the situation in which many of these families, our community neighbors, find themselves. But our Main Street CDC partners tell us: "These families are truly in need in every sense of the word; the Lions food baskets make a difference in their lives on those holidays."

Recurring Service

Our Club had no MAJOR service activities in January, but continued to perform regular recurring service:

- Eyeglass Recycling: The former NoVA Recycling Center closed mid-Dec; the new facility is being prepared for operation, and is tentatively slated to open February 1. Lion Scott collects donated eyeglasses from several collection points each month. We need 1-2 Lions to help Lion Scott with the collection process (emptying donation boxes in local offices/stores). If you can help-out 1-2 hours a month, on a regular basis, please let Scott know. As previously reported, the recycling center is highly productive, distributing over 3.5 million pair of eyeglasses worldwide in the past twenty-one years.
- <u>Bingo at the Nursing Center</u>: Lions Jeff and Anh Tu and others call bingo, help residents mark their bingo cards, and award prizes each month for residents of the Fairfax Nursing Center.

A Little Bit About Virginia Lions Eye Institute (VLEI) Foundation

Fairfax Lions support the VLEIF. It performs wonderful services, summarized briefly here.



The VLEI Foundation was incorporated in 1979 and adopted as a District 24-A (now District 24-L) project by the District Governor's Cabinet in 1980. The VLEI operates as a separate entity with the co-sponsorship of the Inova Health System. It is governed by a Board of Directors representing the Lions Clubs of District 24-L, community ophthalmologists, and the Inova Health Systems Foundation. VLEI funds are used for purchase of equipment, community education, scholarships, and clinical research. Equipment can be placed in not-for-profit hospitals anywhere in District 24-L.

Further, VLEI supports symposia and continuing medical education for nurses and Paraprofessionals in the ophthalmic field. VLEI recently instituted a scholarship award for sight handicapped individuals. Marty has begun circulating the sign-up list for YOU to help out at the sale. In the past two sales (Nov & Dec, 2019), a few club members graciously gave an over-time effort - multiple shifts on

multiple days, filling critical openings in the work schedule. Even so, we had voids in the work schedule. And, if per chance an unplanned event comes up, precluding a Lion from showing up for their shift (hey, we all understand - it happens to everyone!) - we run short handing fruit and servicing customers. It puts an added burden on those Lions working.

ALL: Please take a look at your availability over the three sale days in March 19-21 (Thursday - Saturday), and work AT LEAST one shift. A wise old Lion - Elden - used to say: "Fruit sales are a 3-signature event." Meaning, if EVERY Lion signs-up three times over the work period (unload day, sales days, clean up day), lhe total load is spread across the membership without overburdening any members. You may know, the American Legion Post where we meet is about to embark on a large development project which will affect where we hold future meetings. Tonight's presentation, "Future of Post 177," was by the Post's leadership (introduced by Lion Jeff): the Post Commander, Jeffrey W; the redevelopment Project Manager, Hank W; and Clifton Lion Gary W who is also a member of Post 177 Board of Directors.

We learned many details about the project. The AL Post has entered into a deal to sell some land and redevelop the rest. After 75 years on the current site, the AL's future project will provide 17,000 sq ft of accessible space, 74 multi-family affordable housing units (25% reserved for veterans), 68 multi-family market rate units, a new radio broadcast antenna, and below ground

parking. The little league ball field will remain. The Legion anticipates vacating the current building around Jan 2021 (or later, TBD), with completion of the new structure in about 30 months. Graciously, AL considers our Club a long term partner, and said they plan to include us in their plans for both their temporary facility, and the future new AL Post facility. Happy to hear that!




Fairfax Lions Club Newsletter, February 2020



City of Fairfax Inter-Service Club Council (ISCC)

Like our Lions club, other member clubs of the City of Fairfax ISCC all had busy Decembers. They delivered holiday meals to the less fortunate, filled stockings for children, rang the bell for Salvation Army kettles, assembled bikes destined for children on Christmas morning, and so on....wonderful service in our own community. And those clubs perform wonderful services all year-round. A great example is the Shepherd's Center of Fairfax-Burke. It schedules drivers 5-days every week to take older adults no longer able to drive to hospitals or other medical appointments. This service is free of charge to all clients over 50 years of age residing in Burke or Fairfax. The Shepherd's Center reported at the January ISCC meeting, an average of 6 rides were provided EVERY weekday throughout the year of 2019!!!

A thought from one ISCC member organization: "Many of our organizations and you personally have supported charities providing support to the intellectually disabled. I want to call your attention to an organization which is trying to fill the need for housing these individuals since the closing of Northern Virginia Training Center. It's Marian Homes, Inc. It has currently has purchased and operates 6 homes and has a Fairfax County Grant of \$470,000 to purchase a 7th home. The grant only provides 60% of the funding to complete the acquisition and required renovations of the 7th home. Please consider donations from your organizations or individually to Marian Homes Inc (501C3 organization). You can get more info on their web-site (www.Marionhomes.org)."

FYI - Tips on Securing Electronics When You Travel

Now is the time to take stock of our defenses and I'm not talking about pickpockets and hotel safe thieves. What I mean is guarding against cybercriminals who, unfortunately, prey on business travelers particularly - everywhere from coffee shops to airports to hotels, even whole foreign countries.

A few steps will keep your data safe on the road and it is vastly more valuable than the devices themselves. At least in my case where I usually travel with a five year old Chromebook, somtimes an iPad Air 2, neither having much value. The Pixel 3 XL phone has a little value but not much. A suggestion: always travel with disposable tech gear that you won't miss.

It's the data that I am concerned about because a criminal could feast on my financial accounts and maybe find a way to monetize data gleaned from emails and documents, many thousands of both on my devices. Here are my steps towards safe travels.

Countries That Spy on You

Whole countries? You bet. Visit China and you will hear that the "Great Firewall" means you cannot access Gmail and lots of other websites. You will also hear that, psst, use a VPN - only certain vendors pass muster and the list is a changing target - and you will be able to surf to Gmail, Facebook, you name it.

But you have to wonder: is the Chinese government monitoring that VPN traffic and do they have keys that decode it?

Know too that high level security consultants - with clients inside the Beltway and on the highest floors of Fortune 100 office towers - urge their clients to bring a clean computer and a clean phone, no business data on either, and to never access sensitive information while in China because your devices will be copied on your travels. Not might be. Will be.

Maybe not the gear of Bob Schub, average citizen, but if there is a reason to think you might have interesting info on your computer or phone know it will be copied. Do not bring your every day business computers or phones to China. Don't. China is not alone. Here's a map of the world with nations that heavily monitor Internet traffic highlighted. There are places you might not go - Saudi Arabia - and there are places you might go that monitor at least some traffic (Russia, Turkey). Know before you go and, when in doubt, use clean devices when traveling overseas.

Password Protect Your Phone

At least once a month a friend or neighbor asks me, what do I do, I was traveling and I lost my phone? Sometimes they say it was stolen. It doesn't matter. You probably will never see it again. Know this happens, take steps now to protect yourself.

Set up Find My Device (Android) or Find My iPhone in Settings. Now. When you lose a device it may help you find it and - crucially - it may let you wipe the device which means erasing all personal data.

Also, lock the phone, with a PIN or biometric, in Security (Android) or TouchID and Passcode (Apple). That simple step will keep most criminals away from your data and, in most cases, they only want the phone hardware anyway.

The data is more valuable than the hardware but most criminals are grab and run small change crooks and that's the good news.

Just take the two simple steps above and, yes, you can cry about losing a \$1000 piece of hardware but at least your data and bank accounts will stay safe and that is what matters.

Never Use a Public Phone Recharging Station

You see them in airports, also at meeting venues. Don't use them. They are a fast track to getting hacked. It's tempting. Your phone is beeping for juice. Just let it die. Or always carry a plug when on the road, as I do. Often there are two in my bag. They do get forgotten in hotels, a spare is a good idea.

Don't Use Public WiFi

Never, don't. That means no public WiFi at airports, coffee shops, and definitely not hotels.

You say you are protected because you use a VPN. Good luck with that (read about China above). Know that there are known vulnerabilities in consumer facing VPNs and there also are vulnerabilities with enterprise grade VPNs.

Personally I sometimes use Google's VPN on a Google Fi phone when accessing the Internet but generally I am reading the news or checking a website and if that traffic is hijacked, so be it.

My preference is to create a cellphone hotspot and access the Internet via cellular data networks. A few clicks in setting and you are in business.

You really think public WiFi is faster and of course it usually is cheaper? There is one safe way to use public WiFi - read the next step.

Use a Secure Cloud Based Browser

When on the road and accessing sensitive data via public WiFi, I use Silo, a remote browser that processes all data remotely, in the cloud. (Here's a paper on the technicalities.) It then transmits an encrypted display of the data to you so you "see" the web page but any computing functions have occurred in the cloud, at a remove from your computer.

There are other remote browsers.

Whichever you use, know that when you look at a page with toxic code, no prob, the bad stuff happens in the cloud. Not on your computer.

And eavesdroppers - who often listen in on public WiFi sessions - will only see an encrypted data steam that won't mean a thing to them.

That's five steps. Take them and there's no guarantee of data security on the road. But you can know you are taking steps to secure your phone, your computer, your Internet traffic. And that puts you in a safer place than 99% of travelers





Bob's WW2 Duty Station - the USS Saratoga: Aircraft Carrier in the Pacific

- Shortly after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Saratoga was the centerpiece of the
 unsuccessful American effort to relieve Wake Island, and was torpedoed by a Japanese
 submarine a few weeks later. After lengthy repairs, the ship supported forces participating
 in the Guadalcanal Campaign and her aircraft sank the light carrier Ryūjō during the Battle
 of the Eastern Solomons in August 1942. She was again torpedoed the following month
 and returned to the Solomon Islands area after repairs were completed.
- In 1943, Saratoga supported Allied forces involved in the New Georgia Campaign and invasion of Bougainville in the northern Solomon Islands and her aircraft twice attacked the Japanese base at Rabaul in November.
- Early in 1944, her aircraft provided air support during the Gilbert and Marshall Islands Campaign before she was transferred to the Indian Ocean for several months to support the British Eastern Fleet as it attacked targets in Java and Sumatra. After a brief refit in mid-1944, the ship became a training ship for the rest of the year.
- In early 1945, Saratoga participated in the Battle of Iwo Jima as a dedicated night fighter carrier. Several days into the battle, she was badly damaged by kamikaze hits and was forced to return to the United States for repairs. While under repair, the ship, now increasingly obsolete, was permanently modified as a training carrier with some of her hangar deck converted into classrooms. Saratoga remained in this role for the rest of the war and was then used to ferry troops back to the United States after the Japanese surrender in August.
- In mid-1946, the ship was a target for nuclear weapon tests during Operation Crossroads. She survived the first test with little damage, but was sunk by the second test.

Robert Bruce Stahl was born May 18, 1917, in Pittsburgh, PA but he was raised in Columbus, OH, where he graduated from South HS. He worked his way through the Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts, Naval Reserve, and enlisted in the Navy on June 12, 1935. He served aboard USS Langley (CV-1), attended the US Naval Academy Preparatory School, entered the USNA and graduated December 19, 1941, as part of the Class of 1942.

He reported aboard the USS Saratoga in Pearl Harbor and served throughout the war in the ship's Gunnery Department as Lookout Officer, 2nd Division Officer, and Training Officer. He married Jane King of Detroit, April 12, 1942, while the ship was being repaired from its first torpedoing. They have one daughter and two grandchildren.

He served in engineering and research billets during the rest of his career, retiring in August 1962 as a commander - to a happy life in "little old Fairfax, VA."
