


News of Club Meetings

eyeglasses for recycling (from the collection box at Providence Presbyterian Church), and also donated books to include with our Club's annual Books for our Club's Children Reading program.


Lion Joe Breda brought two guests: Henry and Dan (father & son) Sauer. We hope to see them soon at another meeting!

Our speaker was invited by Lion Rodney - she is a vision impaired friend, Ms Annette Carr, who told us about "AIRA." Artificial Remote Intelligence Assistance is a nifty smart-phone app (paid service) providing a valuable resource for vision impaired persons. In short, the phone's camera enables a

remote assistant (a real person) help the holder of the phone with navigation, locating objects, understanding surroundings, etc.


April 19 Dinner Meeting



The monthly ISCC meeting, on April 6, was at the Fairfax Moose Lodge. The guest speaker was Allison Page of Food for Others. Allison recognized Fairfax Lions Club for our many past donations (especially our donations leveraging matching LoVF funds for greater impact, and our special Power-Pack donations led by Lion James Friedlander). Allison talked about how the food need has grown especially with inflation - in our own community. About 80,000 individuals are food-insecure in the greater Fairfax area. She showed a sample "Power Pack" (one power pack feeds one child for a whole weekend), and said studies have shown that decent weekend meals (like, power packs) not only nourish the child but also improve kid's test scores in school.



More on AIRA

Innovative Company Uses Technology to Provide a Game Changing Solution for Blind and Visually Impaired Consumers By by Lion Rodney Neely

Aira is a new service that uses a cell phone to connect blind and visually impaired people with

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sighted readers to help them to perform every day tasks more efficiently. Aira uses the camera on your smart phone in combination with an app to connect a blind or visually impaired person to a trained agent who will assist the blind person by visually interpreting his/her surroundings. These Aira agents are trained to describe environments to blind people. They are also trained to read information to blind consumers. These Aira agents can also assist with helping blind and visually impaired workers to create and revise documents and PowerPoint presentations. Many blind people use Aira agents to help them to travel in unfamiliar locations such as airports or train stations. Blind people, who need visual information, use Aira for everyday tasks such as reading mail and to perform digital tasks like shopping online or creating presentations. Blind people also use Aira to help them to travel in new environments with confidence. This service is available seven days per week 24 hours a day.

When a blind or visually impaired person wants to use Aira, he/she uses his/her cell phone to contact an Aira agent through the Aira app. Then the user can ask the Aira agent to look through his/ her cell phone camera to read a computer screen or May 2022 Page 20 some mail to him/her. The Aira assistant can use the blind person's cell phone camera to help the person to find a bathroom or an airport gate in an unfamiliar location. There is another utility (Teamviewer) that enables Aira assistants to connect to a blind person's computer to help him/her to make corrections and edits to his/her documents.

At the touch of a button on his/her cell phone, a blind person can use Aira to provide access to visual information. Aira has enhanced the lives of many blind people by providing the ability for them to engage with their environment and to work and play more independently.

Aira is not a free service. There are monthly plans for various levels of Aira service.

Hacked QR codes...What Will They Do next?

QR codes are becoming much more common, especially in recent years. You can find them almost anywhere, whether in advertisements, at your favorite restaurant, or at the checkout counter. Quick Response (QR) codes can make it fast and convenient to access a particular website, make a payment, or view information — just a quick scan using your phone will allow you to open a webpage on your screen. However, it is always important to stay vigilant, because not every QR code is as it seems.



Because QR codes are effortless to generate, cybercriminals are taking advantage of this quick and convenient functionality in an attempt to steal users' information and data. For example, ABC News reported on a series of fake QR codes appearing on parking meters in San Antonio, Texas. Scanning this QR code directed users to a fraudulent site to submit payment to a phony vendor. While providing your payment details to a scammer is already very serious, the FBI warns that fake **QR codes can also contain embedded malware that downloads** straight onto your device.

To avoid scanning a fake QR code, the most crucial thing you can do is inspect the URL that pops up while scanning the code. Most devices will preview the URL that the QR code directs to, similar to the hover over feature on a computer. If the URL doesn't match where you intended to visit, do not go any further! Always be cautious of unmarked QR codes or codes that promise a deal that seems extreme — if it looks too good to be true, it probably is. Finally, it is a best practice to avoid sharing personal details or payment information via a QR code - if possible. Instead, you should navigate to the company's website by typing it into your browser directly.

Stay vigilant and stay safe online.

Memorial Day

Memorial Day, May 30: for many Americans it, conjures up images of hamburgers, hot dogs, swimming pools, and summertime. But the last Monday in May serves, most importantly, as a time to honor those who died while fighting in the US Armed Forces.

It's a holiday steeped in somber American history and tradition. The day actually began as "Decoration Day," following the Civil War, when mourners placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers. This special holiday was changed to Memorial Day by federal law in the 1880's. This day has been called: Remembrance Memorial Day.

Yes, Memorial Day has also come to signify the "unofficial" start of summer, but let's remember the heroes who made it all possible. Things to do:

5. In the City of Fairfax, check out the <u>Ride of the</u> <u>Patriots</u> weekend, centered around the Patriot Harley-Davison store. May 27 at 5:00 pm, a motorcycle ride goes to a Candlelight Vigil at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The most visible event is on Sunday at Patriot H-D, when heroes are honored in a community parade, ceremonies, and the ride to "Rolling To Remember." ("Rolling Thunder" was replaced a few years ago by "Rolling To Remember.") Rolling To Remember honors those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice to protect and defend our freedoms and our nation.
