A customer story: Saturday (Nov 19) a Vietnamese man picked-up his order. We thanked him for supporting Lions. He said:

"I buy every year; I will always remember what Lions did for me. In 1975, I came to the US (a refugee from South Vietnam) and needed an eye. Lions helped me get a new eye."

He pointed to one eye - it seemed artificial ... we can only suppose it replaced a bad eye, possibly damaged as the man escaped the Communists in 1975 as they "reunified" South Vietnam to form Socialist Republic of Vietnam.

Overall, sales results were pleasing. Lead Lion Ken Schutz shut the doors at noon Saturday, with only 2 full boxes & 3 ½ boxes of grapefruit left; we donated them to the Lamb Center. We also gave 2 boxes of Mandarins, and 2 ½ boxes of grapefruit for the Thanksgiving food baskets.







goods, or your automobile - and agents would enter your home to asses your household goods.



Lion Jim Davis Interment

The interment for retired US Navy Captain, and Fairfax Lion, Jim Davis took place at Arlington National Cemetery on November 2, 2022.

Jim became a Fairfax Lion in January 2007, sponsored by Lion Elden Wright. Jim was club Treasurer for seven years, and was a main stay in Club fruit sales and eyeglass recycling.

Jim was born in Richmond, VA Oct 12, 1940, grew up in an Army family, lived in VA, SC, TX, & Germany. He graduated Fairfax HS in 1959, and in 1964 from UVA. He served thirty years in the Navy, retiring as a Captain (equivalent to Army Colonel).

As a retired USN Captain, Jim's interment ceremony included full military honors, with a Navy escort platoon, band, colors team, caisson, firing party, presentation of US Burial Flag to Sarah Davis, and sounding Taps. Jim's pastor from Providence Presbyterian Church - Rev. Dr. Michael P. Burns participated in the service.

Margaret Mead

(Taken from Nov 2022 newsletter for Retired Employees of Fairfax County Government: "Hot Flashes") Years ago, anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about fishhooks, clay pots, or grinding stones.

But Mead said no, the first sign of civilization in ancient culture was a femur thigh bone that had been broken and then healed. Mead explained that you die if you break your leg in the animal



kingdom. You cannot run from danger, get to the river for a drink, or hunt for food. You are meat for a prowling beast. No animals survive a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

A broken femur that has healed is evidence that someone has taken time to stay with the one who fell, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety, and attended the person through recovery. Helping someone through difficulty is where civilization starts, Mead said.

How to Slow Memory Loss?

Forgetting things can be scary.

- Where are my keys?
- · What time was that important meeting scheduled?
- Oh, and... what was the amusing third thing I was going to include on this list?

While I wait for that final item to come to me, let's talk about a promising new study out of Columbia University and Duke University, which suggests there's a simple, common, under-appreciated activity that can help slow memory loss among the people who need it most.

Writing in the journal NEJM Evidence, D.P. Devanand, professor of psychiatry and neurology at Columbia, and Murali Doraiswamy, professor of

psychiatry and medicine at Duke, said they recruited 107 volunteers with an average age of 71 and had them either do crossword puzzles or play computer video games (depending on what cohort they were assigned to) over a period of many weeks.

The results? **Participants who did crossword puzzles fared much better in terms of memory loss or lack thereof** compared to those who played video games, as measured by cognitive tests and changes in brain size (measured with an MRI) over the course of 78 weeks.

"The trifecta of improving cognition, function, and neuroprotection is the Holy Grail for the field," Dr. Doraiswamy said in a press statement, adding that, "[further research to scale brain training as a homebased digital therapeutic for delaying Alzheimer's should be a priority for the field."

Now, I've learned that there are three things that most successful people worry about almost universally:

- maintaining their professional success,
- nurturing their families, and
- holding off old age and health challenges as long as possible.

When it comes to those health challenges, there's a special emphasis on aging and preventing memory loss, which is why I think this study is particularly interesting.

Sure, I suspect a lot of readers might think about doing a crossword puzzle or two after hearing about it, but I also think this sort of unusual study represents something that just about anyone running a business might want to pay attention to.

Our society is graying. In 2018, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, 15 percent of Americans were older than 65; by 2030 the percentage will be 21 percent. By 2035, there will be more older adults in America than kids.

Nearly every single one of those older Americans will worry about getting older and becoming a burden on loved ones. They'll be looking for answers and solutions.

As a result, as soon as I saw this study, my first reaction wasn't to worry about what the future might hold.

Instead it was... wait, what was it?

Just kidding: It was to think about organizations like the New York Times, which bought Wordle earlier this year and has tripled down on all kinds of word-Dec 2022 Page 32 related games, to say nothing of the Times crossword that it's published daily since 1942.

It seems like they know what they're doing.

In business, they say to start with a problem and then come up with a compelling solution. This study sounds to me like it screams from the rooftops: Here's a thing that a growing number of people viscerally fear, along with a promising possible way to combat it.

Gosh, what's the word for that? It's right on the tip of my tongue: 11 letters, I think?. Oh that's right, I remember now: opportunity.
