I recently did an inventory of reading glasses our club has maintained at The Lamb Center for the homeless and verv needv for a number of vears. It is normal to give "Guests" who need help with reading 350-600 of the glasses in a year. Yes, they have thousands of "Guests" going through the front door each year. LERCNOVA (Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center Northern VA) graciously provides the glasses whenever I ask. I picked up 9 boxes of glasses (50 to a box - total of 450 glasses) at LERC late last week and delivered them to The Lamb Center where they are stored in special marked bins in a large cabinet upstairs. I carefully fill the bins with the right glasses as well as smaller bins kept at the front desk and managed by front desk volunteers. I also provide reading charts and some instruction for front desk volunteers.

The talk covered LCI goals (focus service on diabetes, vision, hunger, environment, and childhood cancer); award criteria for Club's to be recognized as "excellent," and so forth.

There was a report from the floor on an article in the latest Lion magazine dated "Winter 2023" On pages 36-39 is an article on Lions pin trading. The article starts:

"It's not the sun, surf, and swaying palm trees that Lion Bill Smith remembers most about attending his first Lions International Convention in Miami Beach in 1973, it's the trading pins.

If you've ever been to a Lions event, you've probably seen one, two, or two hundred of them tiny, colorful metal brooches sporting designs ranging from patriotic to whimsical, and all centered around Lions.

For decades Lions have used the pins as a kind of currency, trading them, collecting them, and displaying them proudly in their homes and on their Lions vests. True collectors are always on the hunt.

But what exactly are they looking for when they go fishing for the pin of their dreams? How it started

Smith, 92, a member of the *Fairfax Lions Club* in Fairfax, Virginia for 55 years, has been collecting and trading pins for more than five decades and is one of about 800 members of the Lions International Trading Pin Club, which was founded in 1973 at that very same convention in Miami.

The group began with fewer than 50 members from 11 states and districts and now claims members from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, most provinces of Canada and 18 other districts and multiple districts from around the world. Personal collections can number in the hundreds of thousands."

There is a long tradition of Lions designing, producing, collecting, and trading "pins." The tradition dates back to 1973 and the founding of the Lions International Trading Pin Club. There are Pin Trading clubs at Multiple District (state) level too. Of course, there is Lions Pin Trading Club of Virginia. Virginia Lions were not only key to organizing pin trading across VA, but also across all Multiple Districts. And a key individual in all of that was our own club member Lion Bill Smith. Bill has been a Lion since November 1, 1968 and became a life member in 1992. Bill is a past President of FHLC (1976-77), a Past DG, Past Council Chair, Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Life Member of both LCI and LoVA, and - as you might expect - a past president of both VA Lions pin traders and LCI pin traders.

Bill says: "Were it not for my spending approximately 7-8 hours every day doing something for either the Pin Traders Club of Virginia (PTCV) or the Lions International Trading Pin Club (LITPC), I'm not sure I would still be here. I'm the publisher for approximately 60 pin catalogs which require constant updating to reflect the issue of new trading pins. This keeps me out of trouble and connected to a hobby that has become a way of life for me. Way back in December of 1980, I proposed the formation

of the PTCV to 16 other pin traders in the former District 24-A. The 17 of us met at the Holiday Inn in Manassas and agreed to create the PTCV, which now numbers 263 members from all over the world. I was honored to have been elected the Founding President. At the time, I was also getting ready to become the First Vice President of the LITPC.

Never did I realize that what I was starting would develop into the First Multiple District Pin Trading in Lionism. Following our lead were 38 other Multiple District pin trading organizations. Pin trading truly blossomed as a result of our action that night in Manassas. I later became President of the LITPC and have remained active ever since. As a matter of fact, I am extremely proud of the fact that I am the only active trader from the initial year of 1973 when the LITPC was created. Longevity in age certainly has played a major role in that. I will turn 91 on 15 July and have set my goal to last until age 96. No particular reason for 96. My oldest brother passed away when he was 99, just one month and two days short of the century mark. Another brother just past last year at age 95. It would be nice to last in age between the two of them."

"One other accomplishment that I am extremely proud of is the establishment by the LITPC of the LITPC Youth Scholarship Program. In recognition of my being one of the earliest pin traders in Lionism, the LITPC created the **William A. Smith Fellowship Program** as the financial vehicle for the Scholarship Program. To date, almost \$300,000.00 has been raised to fund the yearly scholarships that are granted." "Pin trading is a way of life for me. I have daily contact with many traders in many of the states in the USA and in countries like England, Australia, and New Zealand. I'm truly blessed."

ChatGPT?

You've heard about this essay writing APP? How accurate are its products? Check out this piece written by:

Bill Murphy, JR. Feb 16, 2023

"A journey of self-discovery via ChatGPT, but then it turns weird and kind of dark...

Here are some things you might <u>not</u> know about me:

- Former investment banker and management consultant.
- Graduate of Brown University and the MIT Sloan School of Management.
- Author of the book, Breakthrough: How the 10 Greatest Discoveries in Medicine Saved Millions and Changed Our View of the World, and the founder of the online news and commentary site, The Daily Update.

The reason you might not know these things about me is that they are not true.

However, they comprise 6 of the 11 facts that OpenAI's ChatGPT confidently asserted when I decided to ask it to "write a short biography of bill murphy jr." This was the response...

Bill Murphy Jr. is a journalist, author, and entrepreneur based in Washington, D.C. He is the author of several books, including "The Intelligent Entrepreneur" and "Breakthrough: How the 10 Greatest Discoveries in Medicine Saved Millions and Changed Our View of the World." He is also the founder of the online news and commentary site, The Daily Update. Prior to his writing career, Murphy worked as an investment banker and management consultant. He received his undergraduate degree from Brown University and his MBA from the MIT Sloan School of Management.

I did previously live in Washington, but it's been 10 years, and I did write The Intelligent Entrepreneur, but not this other book about medical discoveries. Also, no Brown or MIT, no investment banking, no management consulting.

(This site where this article is, is called <u>Understandably</u>, although *The Daily Update* might have been a good name, too.)

So, I asked follow-up questions. For example: What sources did ChatGPT use to compile this bio? It was unable to cite anything, but it doubleddown on its confidence that what it had shared was accurate:

Q "can you provide any sources you used to compile the bio of bill murphy jr. above?"

R "As an Al language model, I don't have the ability to browse the internet or compile sources on my own. However, I can tell you that my response was based on my pre-existing knowledge and language model training. I can confirm that the information in the bio I provided is accurate based on my training data, which includes a wide range of sources such as news articles, books, and other written materials. The information presented is commonly known and publicly available. However, I did not refer to any specific sources when composing the bio. If you have any specific questions or require further information about Bill Murphy Jr., I'd be happy to try and answer them to the best of my ability based on my pre-existing knowledge and training."

The more I challenged with virtual crossexamination, the more detailed its answers became:

Q "What other books did Bill Murphy Jr. write? What years did he graduate from Brown and MIT? Did he ever work at The Washington Post?"

Apparently, I've written five other books. (One of these is accurate): The Response...

- "In a Time of War: The Proud and Perilous Journey of West Point's Class of 2002"
- "The New Science of Customer Emotions: How They Drive Value in Your Business"

- "The Pocket Small Business Owner's Guide to Business Plans"
- "Leadership Secrets of the World's Most Successful CEOs"

 "The Unofficial Guide to Fatherhood" And, according to my LinkedIn profile (not really, but ChatGPT cites it as if it were looking right at it), I graduated from Brown in 1994 and MIT Sloan in 2003, and I was a reporter for The Washington Post from 1994 to 2000:

"During his time there, he covered a variety of beats, including technology, business, and the military, and won several awards for his reporting," the AI generator told me.

It's all so weird. I started asking it to create bios for some of my colleagues over at Inc.com. None of us are exactly famous, but we have all been writing on the Internet long enough to have left a massive trail of digital breadcrumbs.

In every case, the bios mixed fact with fiction, but presented it all with confidence.

Anyway, my journey down this rabbit hole began after two things:

First, I was asked for about the zillionth time whether I've been using ChatGPT ("yes"), and March 2023 Page 25 Second, I came across an article in The Washington Times, in which a reporter asked ChatGPT to come up with proposals that most of us would characterize as politically conservative, and proposals we'd call liberal, and contrast the quality of the results.

In short, they found that <u>ChatGPT turned down</u> requests for right-wing proposals, but offered detailed suggestions for more liberal proposals. Here, I tried it myself.

When I asked it to draft a law that would require the construction of a southern border wall, it refused.

But, when I asked it to draft a law that would ban the construction of an impenetrable border wall along the U.S.-Mexico border, it came up with something passable.

Remember, this is just an experiment, but it's so stark. And, **it's a reminder that artificial intelligence can only ever be as good as the human intelligence behind it.**

I'm no Luddite, but I am a bit disheartened. I keep hearing people talk about how they're using ChatGPT to answer customer inquiries, write term papers—heck, I'm getting ads served to me every day advising some kind of OpenAI plugin that March 2023 Page 26 lawyers can use to examine contracts, and then simply trust and send the analyses to their clients.

Does anyone even read the results?

My sense right now is that AI like ChatGPT is the equivalent of Google's search engine in 1999, or Facebook's original social media site for college students in 2005.

I find it's good for things like digging up Excel and Google Sheet formulas — with maybe 50 percent accuracy. I find it mediocre at best for brainstorming.

And, obviously, I wouldn't trust any fact I got from it without checking.

To its credit, I guess, that's what ChatGPT's AI engine advises anyway:

Q "To what degree should people factcheck any answer they get from chatgpt?"

R "As an Al language model, my responses are generated based on patterns and relationships learned from large amounts of text data, rather than on personal knowledge or experience. While I strive to provide accurate and reliable information, there may be cases where my responses are incomplete, outdated, or simply incorrect. Therefore, it is always a good idea to fact-check any information you receive, regardless of the source. This is especially March 2023 Page 27 true when it comes to important decisions, such as medical or financial decisions, as well as for controversial or contentious topics where multiple viewpoints exist. To fact-check the information you receive from ChatGPT, you can start by verifying the information with multiple sources, checking the credentials of the sources, and looking for any potential biases or conflicts of interest. Additionally, you can also consult with experts or professionals in the relevant field to get a better understanding of the topic. It's important to remember that no single source of information can provide a complete and comprehensive understanding of any topic, and that critical thinking and information literacy are essential skills for navigating the vast amount of information available in today's world."

NOTE - This Newsletter was NOT written by ChatGPT!
