

Club Meetings

Dinner Meeting - July 16th

Our first dinner meeting of the new Lions year featured an outstanding speaker - Rob Calhelha, a Civil War reenactor. 1st VP Cory Green and Rob

work in the same TSA organization, and Rob agreed to speak showing up in full uniform as a Private of the 2nd Wisconsin **Infantry** of the Union Army. That regiment spent most of the Civil War in the "Iron Brigade" of the Army of the Potomac, and suffered the largest



number of casualties (by percentage of total enlistment) of any Union Army unit.

Rob discussed his weapon (1861 Springfield musket with bayonet) and equipment, and explained early military insignia - such as the solid red circle



badge on his hat identifying I Corps (1st Division). discussed horrors of warfare and the primeval

field medicine at that time (if wounded, the most likely treatment was amputation), and the very large numbers of soldiers killed - especially in the Battle of the Wilderness.

Ron also brought samples of the standard food that foot soldiers carried. hardtack and salt pork.





Club President and Queen Lion Karen presented Rob the customary speakers gift from our club.



Miscellaneous Info...

The "Dog Days" of Summer

"Dog Days" refers to a period of hot & humid



weather in July & August, in the Northern
Hemisphere. In ancient Greece and Rome, the Dog
Days were believed to be a time of drought, bad luck,
and unrest, when dogs and men alike could be
driven mad by extreme heat! The phrase doesn't
infer such bleak imagery, today, but Dog Days are
associated with summer's peak temperatures and
humidity.

This period of sweltering weather generally coincides with a year's "heliacal" (at sunrise) rising of Sirius,* the Dog Star. Sirius is part of the constellation Canis Majoris—the "Greater Dog"—where Sirius gets its canine nickname, as well as its official name, Alpha Canis Majoris. Sirius is the brightest star in the sky (not including our own Sun). In olden days, it was believed Sirius's dawn rising in the summer led to the extreme weather of the season. That is, the "combined heat" of super-bright Sirius and our Sun was thought to cause summer's



Sirius, the brightest star sweltering temperatures. The name "Sirius" even stems from the Ancient Greek seírios, meaning "scorching."

For the ancient Egyptians, Sirius's dawn rising also coincided with the Nile River's flood season. They used the star as a "watchdog" for that event

Of course, Sirius does not actually affect seasonal weather on Earth; but its appearance during the

hottest part of summer ensures the lore surrounding the SIRIUS star lives on today!



The exact dates of the Dog Days can vary from source to source. Most sources agree the Dog Days occur in mid-to-late summer. The Old Farmer's Almanac considers the Dog Days to begin July 3 and end August 11, amidst the typically worst of summer's heat.

*More on Sirius

Sirius is the brightest star in the sky if you don't count our own Sun. Under the right conditions, it can

even be seen with the naked eye during the day. As the brightest star in the sky, it's not hard to find.

Learn how to find the Dog Star in the night sky

Shark attacks are rare...but if you do encounter a shark, here's what to do.

The 1975 movie JAWS broadly introduced a fear of sharks. Today, it seems like there are a lot of sharks at the beaches. Although shark attacks are actually very rare, if do you spot one in the water, here's what to do: Stay calm; move away; definitely leave the water. If you are in a boat, do not toy with the animal. If you are attacked, fight back. Shark experts say: strike sensitive spots — eyes and gills ...make the shark regret having you in its mouth. For more, see NPR

By the way, in the movie JAWS, the crusty old boat captain "Quint" (played by actor Robert Shaw) told of being a shark-attack survivor of the WWII USS Indianapolis that was sunk by an enemy sub in the Pacific. Of 1,195 crewmen aboard the Indianapolis, about 300 went down with the ship. The remaining 890 faced exposure, dehydration, saltwater poisoning, and vicious shark attacks while stranded in the open ocean with few lifeboats and almost no food or water.
