Vision Screening Consideration

Should our vision screening focus more on younger children?

Lion Davida Luehrs, District 24L Chair for Vision, recently encouraged Lions Clubs in the district to put more emphasis on **doing vision screening at pre-school level**. This is based on information she received during training from **plusOptix** (manufacturer of a hand-held vision screener).

According to the *plusOptix* trainer, the time window for effective treatment of some childhood

vision issues begins to diminish as early as age six or seven!

Information from *plusOptix* website, FAQ:

- 1. Does my child have vision disorder? Eye screening can answer this question. On average one in every five 4-year-olds has an undetected vision disorder that may lead to Amblyopia (lazy eye) without early detection. This high percentage is not surprising as vision disorders, unlike many other diseases, often have no obvious or detectable symptoms. But two healthy eyes are essential to a child's well-being. A poor sight as a result of a visual impairment affects school performance, increases the risk of accidents, and more. The earlier a vision disorder is detected, the better it can be treated.
- Does a small child notice a vision disorder?
 Affected children don't notice their own vision disorder because they are accustomed to seeing the world with their own eyes and have no way to compare.
- 3. Why is vision screening important? Many vision disorders, if not detected and treated during the first years of life, can lead to permanent visual

- impairment, which neither glasses nor any other visual aid can address.
- 4. What is involved during vision screening? Refraction measurement (how the light bends as it passes through the eye) is an important part of vision screening. This helps determine whether the eyes are developing age appropriately – especially in infants.
- 5. Why is an ordinary vision test insufficient? The sooner a vision disorder is detected and treated, the greater the probability there is for successful treatment. Ordinary eye tests or visual acuity tests can only be administered when the child is able to speak. Furthermore, these tests are not able to test refractive errors accurately.
- 6. From what age is vision screening recommended? All children should undergo regular vision screening. The first screening should take place as early as possible, ideally around the age of one. If there is a family history of eye disorders, earlier vision screening is advised at 5 to 8 months old. Thereafter, regular screening is recommended as the eyes change with growth and vision disorders can arise during this process.

Summary: Our club already places importance on screening pre-school children (typically age 3-5). Extending our screenings to include infants and toddlers (age 6 months to 3 years) makes good sense given the information above. The key is finding ways to efficiently screen reasonably large numbers of these younger children in a short period of time. Health fairs are typically non-productive for any age group, so some new and unique way to do it will be explored. Interested? See Lion Marty.



Namesake for this Newsletter - Who was Bob Stahl?

We have called this, "The Bob Stahl Memorial Newsletter." Lions in the club in the 1990's knew Bob; most current members never had the opportunity. The recent talk by 1VP Cory Green, on submarines - torpedos especially - reminded some of

us of Bob Stahl's experiences in WWII. About 5 years ago, we included the information below in the newsletter. It seems appropriate to repeat it now.

Born: 18 May 1917 PA



Bob's WW2 Duty Station

Commissioned from the US Naval Academy 12 days after Pearl Harbor (senior year was cut-in-half), Bob spent the entire war on the aircraft carrier **USS Saratoga** in the Pacific theater.

Shortly after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Saratoga was the centerpiece of the unsuccessful American effort to relieve Wake Island; the Saratoga was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine. After lengthy repairs, the ship supported forces in the Guadalcanal Campaign; her aircraft sank the light carrier Ryūjō during the Battle of the Eastern Solomons in August 1942. She was again torpedoed and returned to the Solomon Islands area after repairs.

In 1943, Saratoga supported Allied forces in the New Georgia Campaign and invasion of Bougainville in the northern Solomon Islands; her aircraft twice attacked the Japanese base at Rabaul in November.


Early in 1944, her aircraft provided air support during the Gilbert and Marshall Islands Campaign, then she was transferred to the Indian Ocean to support the British Eastern Fleet as it attacked targets in Java and Sumatra. After a brief refit in mid-1944, the ship became a training ship for the rest of the year.

In early 1945, Saratoga participated in the Battle of Iwo Jima as a night fighter carrier. Several days into the battle, **she was badly damaged by kamikaze hits** and was forced to return to the US for repairs. While under

repair, the ship, now increasingly obsolete, was permanently modified as a training carrier with some of her hangar deck converted into classrooms. Saratoga remained in this role for the rest of the war and was then used to ferry troops back to the US after the Japanese surrender in August. In mid-1946, the ship was a target for nuclear weapon tests during Operation Crossroads. She survived the first test with little damage, but was sunk by the second test.

Can you imagine Bob's experiences, fighting the war on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific theater...when it was torpedoed twice, and attacked by Kamikazes?

A Book About the Saratoga (excerpt about Bob Stahl on right)



ROBERT BRUCE STAHL, was born May 18, 1917 in Pittsburgh, PA but was raised in Columbus, OH where he graduated from South High School. He worked his way through the Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts, Naval Reserve, and joined the Navy June 12, 1935. He served aboard USS Langley (CV-1), attended the Academy Prep School, entered the Naval Academy, and graduated December 19, 1941 in the Class of 1942.

He reported aboard Sara in Pearl Harbor and served throughout the war in the Gunnery Department as Lookout Officer, 2nd Division officer, and Training Officer. He married Jane King of Detroit April 12, 1942 while the ship was being repaired from the first torpedoing. They have one daughter and two granddaughters.

He served in engineering and research billets during the rest of his career, retiring in August 1962 as a commander to a happy life in little old Fairfax. VA

First Submarine Fully Integrated for Coed Crews

1VP Cory Green told us about submarines, then this news item appeared...(in "Stars and Stripes")

The USS New Jersey, the first US Navy submarine fully integrated for mixed gender crews will join the Navy fleet next week. The fast-attack submarine's modifications included obvious ones — more doors and washrooms to create separate sleeping and bathing areas — and some that are more subtle — lowering some overhead valves and making them easier to turn and installing steps in front of the triple-high bunk beds.



The Navy received the New Jersey, its 23rd Virginia-class, fast-attack submarine in April 2024. The first fully integrated sub for mixed-gender crews, the New Jersey will join the fleet on Sept. 14, 2024, during a commissioning ceremony.

The USS New Jersey, a fast-attack submarine, will become a deployable part of the Navy's force during the ceremony at Naval Weapons Station Earle in New Jersey on Sept. 14, culminating five years of construction that represents a historic shift in how Navy submarines are designed.
