Yes, our Lions club does a lot of volunteer work and provides other kinds of support involving sight – one of our core missions. Included are:

- Vision and hearing screenings for children (K-12)
- Used eyeglass collection (up to 10,000 pair a year for our club alone)
- Eyeglass recycling center (recycled eyeglasses mostly for medical mission trips)
- Recycled reading glasses for the homeless at The Lamb Center
- Eyeglasses for the poor
- Inova/Lions free eye clinic for the poor (optometrist and ophthalmologist type of care)
- Scholarships for students with major sight needs
 We would love to have you join us in any capacity
 you like. Two other GMU students are already doing the
 same. They are Ben Dilzer, 540-955-7073 or

 jrdnjacobi@gmail.com. You are encouraged to contact
 them. Ben is a member of our club. Another member of
 the club is one of the most well respected 'low vision'
 ophthalmologists in the area.

I mostly work with volunteers to handle vision and hearing screenings. We have our own calibrated equipment and processes to screen children at private and religious schools. We can quickly and easily train you at a screening event. Most of those are in the fall; some are in the spring.

Let me know what you think. Also take a look at our website. It is very actively maintained and contains a lot of information about what we do. If you remain in the area during the summer, you can probably work with Ben or I to go visit some of the places listed above.

slides of a super-hero character associated with the officer being installed. You can recognize characters for Lions Gary & Karen.





VTD offers alternatives to incarceration for veterans in the criminal justice system. VTD aims to return productive, law-abiding veterans to our community, reduce recidivism, and improve public safety by providing individualized comprehensive treatment and supervision responsive to veterans' unique strengths, needs, and culture. Lion Marty was recognized in a ceremony for veterans "graduating" from VTD. Marty is retiring from his work as a

Do You Know the 2VP, Lion Tom Hewlett?

Tom Hewlett was born in Ft Worth, Texas, in the early 1960s. For his first few years, he was raised in the back of his father's Hi-Fi (High Fidelity) audio shop in Dallas, Texas. Tom's family migrated east from Texas to Kansas, Illinois, and Vienna, Virginia. He developed an enthusiasm for camping, hiking, running, skiing, and community service along the way.

After graduating high school, Tom joined the Army and served as a radio teletype operator with the 32nd Signal Battalion V Corp in Hoechst, Germany. After completing a two-year tour of duty, he received his honorable discharge and went to work for AFRC (Armed Forces Recreation Centers) Sports Shop in Munich, Germany. By day, Tom mounted ski bindings and sold sports equipment; by night, he took night classes at the University of Maryland University College. On weekends, he spent time skiing in the German and Swiss Alps. Tom developed a passion for Earth Science and Geography during his time in Germany.

In the mid-1980s, Tom returned to the United States and earned his degree in Earth Science from the Geography Department at the University of North Texas. His first job out of college was with the North

Central Texas Council of Governments as a GIS (Geographic Information Systems) Analyst supporting regional urban planning projects. After five years, he joined Esri (Environment Systems Research Institute), a leading GIS software company. With over 37 years of professional GIS data collection, implementation, and consulting experience, Tom assists customers in successfully utilizing geographic information to support their organization's missions.

Tom is married to his college sweetheart, Veronica. His daughter Josephine is currently studying English and communications at James

Booking.com Reservation Abused as Cybercriminals Steal from Travelers

A recruitment marketing specialist (named Robert Woodford), recently <u>shared on LinkedIn</u> how he fell victim to a sophisticated scam while booking a hotel in Verona using the service Booking.com. It provides a striking example of how attacks on the hospitality industry affect travelers.

After completing a legitimate booking - and trading some communications with the hotel - Woodford received a separate message that he believed came from the official Booking.com

messaging system. The message requested "missing details" and a prepayment.

To be safe, Woodford logged into Booking.com directly rather than clicking any links. There, he found the same message in the same thread as his earlier communications with the hotel. The payment link also looked official, as it contained "bookingcom" in the URL. Woodford didn't realize until after making the payment that the merchant's name was incorrect and the payment was fraudulent. Cybercriminals exploited real booking data and trusted platforms.

Lesson & Advice for Travelers

Cybercriminals are no longer just targeting guests. They are infiltrating hospitality systems themselves, turning trusted platforms into vectors for fraud.

Robert lost a few hundred quid and the trust in his bank, the travel platform he used, and a bit of trust in his own judgement. While Robert was vigilant and still became a victim, there are some tips to keep in mind:

- Always access booking platforms by typing URLs directly into your browser; DO NOT click links in emails or messages.
- Verify any payment requests by contacting the hotel or booking platform through official channels. You can also call the hotel directly.

- Be suspicious of urgent payment demands or requests for unusual payment methods.
- Use credit cards for bookings where possible, or other options that provide fraud protection.
- Report suspicious messages to the booking platform immediately.
- Use browser protection against scams, credit card skimmers, and other malicious sites.
- Be aware of the fact that the systems you trust might be compromised. Vigilance and proactive security measures are essential for both travelers and hotels to mitigate these risks.

Think Twice Before Clicking "Unsubscribe"

That link at the bottom of your email might make you a bigger target. There are times when your inbox feels like it's under siege, emails flooding in daily, offering everything. Nearly every email ends with the same invitation: "Click here to unsubscribe."

Before you do, however, consider: While we've long been told that "unsubscribe" is a simple and safe way to get off email lists we never signed up for or no longer care about, that isn't always the case. In fact, cybersecurity experts now warn that in many instances, clicking that link might do more harm than good. (Click to read more)
